Achieving a Vision for Rensselaer County

How do you see Rensselaer County in ten years? Fifty years?

I see extensive forests still keeping my water clean. I see intact wetlands still filtering pollutants and absorbing potential flood waters. I see moose, bear, bobcat, scarlet tanagers, pink lady's slippers, and other animals and plants still thriving. I see views of rolling hills and valleys still visible as I drive, run, and hike in the County.

A similar vision for Rensselaer County underlies the new strategic plan RLT is developing. In our last issue I introduced RLT's new vision statement (see left). In addition to clean air and water, wildlife, and scenic landscapes, we recognize that Rensselaer County's quality of life also includes vibrant human communities – urban, suburban, and rural.

RLT's role is to protect lands and waters that are critical parts of this vision. Key questions identified in the Board's strategic planning retreats include: What do we want the land to conserve? How much of Rensselaer County needs to be conserved to make our vision a reality? Where do we pursue land conservation projects?

In order to help answer these questions, one key action in our strategic plan will be to develop a conservation plan for Rensselaer County. The goals of the plan are to identify those natural resources, ecological values, and land uses that are most important to conserve, and to determine what places in the County are most significant to these. For example, our member survey identified clean water as their highest environmental concern. One question addressed by a conservation plan would be, "Which watersheds in the County contribute the most to maintaining clean water?"

A County conservation plan would serve as a guide not just for RLT in proactively engaging in land protection projects, but also for our partners in nondrofits and municipalities.

RLT Benefit Performance at Troy Music Hall

These albums, plus a rigorous international touring schedule, led to collaborations with Marketa Irglova, an appearance on The Late Show with Jimmy Kimmel, as well as a performance for NPR's Tiny Desk Concert series.

Several years ago, musician and naturalist Rowe headed into the wilderness for some much needed solitude. He lived at a survival school called Hawk Circle Wilderness Education for an entire year and eventually embarked on the 24-day solo survival quest. "I spent an entire year liv-

ing off the land and going into the woods and surviving on my own," he says. "I can't think of a more pure experience. I wrote most of the songs that were my first album, Magic. Writing for me is a very solitary experience. The wilderness is my home and my filter. I try to allude to something bigger in my music, but in a subtle way."

Rowe is a natural partner for RLT because of his love of the natural world and his personal connections to Rensselaer County. We are very pleased to partner with Rowe, Troy Savings Bank Music Hall, and John Bulmer Photography to further RLT's work to protect the natural resources that make Rensselaer County such a wonderful place to live and work.

RLT Prepares for Renewal of Accreditation

In 2008, the Rensselaer Land Trust became one of the first 38 land trusts in the country to obtain accreditation through the Land Trust Accreditation Commission. The Commission, an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance, accredits "land conservation organizations that meet national standards for excellence, uphold the public trust and ensure that conservation efforts are permanent." Over 200 of the nation's 1,700 land trusts have now achieved this distinction. Accreditation lasts for five years and, this year, ours is up for renewal. We must undergo

an exhaustive organizational assessment to make sure we still comply with the rigorous standards and practices set forth by the Land Trust Accreditation Commission. With the help of Linda London, our nondrofit management consultant, RLT staff and Board of Directors have been reviewing all of our policies, procedures, and plans to make sure they are ethical, effective, and practical. We want to be ready for the National Accreditation Commission's meticulous review. This takes a great deal of work, but attaining and maintaining National Accreditation is an investment in our organization. It assures us, our donors, and the people who have entrusted their land to us, that our organization is strong enough to defend the fresh water, fields and forests of Rensselaer County.

Public Comment Period for Renewal of Accreditation is Now Open

The land trust accreditation program recognizes land conservation organizations that meet national quality standards for protecting important natural places and working lands forever. The Land Trust Accreditation Commission, an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance, conducts an extensive review of each applicant's policies and programs. The Commission invites public input and accepts signed, written comments on pending applications. Comments must relate to how the RLT complies with national quality standards.
